## 1. <u>PURPOSE OF REPORT</u>

- 1.1 To seek approval of the Bosworth Battlefield: The Way Forward Conservation Management Plan prepared on behalf of Leicestershire County Council and English Heritage. The study will be used to inform the significance of the battlefield to aid in the determination of planning applications which affect this heritage asset and to inform plan making and strategies relating to the battlefield.

# 2. <u>RECOMMENDATION</u>

- 2.1 It is recommended:
  - That Executive endorses the study to be used as part of the evidence base for the Local Plan and inform decision making.
  - That support is given for participation in a community-led local partnership with key stakeholders on matters such as rights of way, access and conservation issues relating to the Battlefield and wider area.

#### 3. BACKGROUND TO THE REPORT

- 3.1 The Battle of Bosworth is a well known historical event of national significance and international interest. The Battlefield was designated a Registered Battlefield area by English Heritage in 1995. Several contradictory theories regarding the location of the battle existed for many years and the determination of a more precise location for the battle was made possible by the Heritage Lottery Fund grant in 2005 and the generous assistance of local landowners. Subsequent detailed research and survey work revealed many finds and located the likely battle site to the southwest of Ambion Hill near Fenn Lane, Dadlington.
- 3.2 The recent discoveries, coupled with the very significant discovery of the remains of Richard III in Leicester, have brought changes- a re-emphasis on the heritage of the area and subsequent increased interest from tourists, local communities and schools.
- 3.3 The Bosworth Battlefield Conservation Management Plan is intended as an aid to the management of the Bosworth Battlefield and its landscape setting. It is a set of guiding principles and policies intended for those involved in the management of the area, including those dealing with recreational activity, land management and planning matters.
- 3.4 The Conservation Plan contains an extensive amount of site survey work, deskbased research and the results of consultation with a wide range of stakeholders including the Borough Council, landowners and English Heritage. It will be a reference point for understanding the areas value and significance and inform the

application of local and national planning policy when determining planning applications within and adjacent to the Battlefield. In addition the plan highlights current issues affecting the significance of the area and factors which may have the potential to affect it in the future. It addresses these through the development of proposed policies and actions which help inform strategic planning, day to day decision making and management. It should be noted that the majority of policies presented within the Conservation Plan can not be directly enforced through the planning system as they stand outside the remit of planning.

3.5 In March 2011, Alison Farmer Associates were commissioned by the County Council and English Heritage to prepare the Conservation Plan, supported by a working group of representatives from the Borough Council, Natural England, English Heritage and the County Council.

# 4. <u>The Conservation Management Plan</u>

- 4.1 The Conservation Management Plan is a technical document which seeks to bring together in one place a fuller understanding of the significance of the Bosworth Battlefield Landscape and the challenges and opportunities going forward.
- 4.2 To achieve this, the plan provides a definition of what constitutes a Battlefield, identifies relevant designations, policies and initiatives, and establishes the remit of the plan. In addition the Plan tells the story of the Battle, the evolution of its landscape setting to the present day and the landscape character and important views including key characteristics.
- 4.3 The plan also examines the physical sources of historical information and identifies and examines the various uses within the battlefield area including tourism and recreational activities.
- 4.4 These considerations culminate in a summary of the significance of the Battlefield area, its values, issues and opportunities for improvement. This in turn seeks to provide a thorough understanding of what is of value, any vulnerabilities to the significances of the area and highlights areas for positive opportunity for change. This understanding provides a firm basis for identifying the policies and actions needed to tackle the issues and conserve and enhance significance.
- 4.5 These policies and actions are divided under the following six themes;
  - 1. Partnership and Communication
  - 2. Living Landscape and Local Economy
  - 3. Protection of the Archaeological Resource
  - 4. Landscape Management
  - 5. Appreciation and Understanding
  - 6. Access and Enjoyment
- 4.6 There are a total of 14 objectives and 44 policies within these six themes. These objectives and policies are illustrated in Appendix A attached to this report.

# 5. <u>The Partnership Forum</u>

- 5.1 The conservation plan proposes a partnership forum to include local residents, heritage and conservation societies, landowners and national organisations to lead the implementation of policies, suggestions for action and organising bids for external funding. The partnership forum will, ideally be led by a local landowner or community representative, with support from the County Council and Borough Council.
- 5.2 The approach to forming the partnership forum is outlined in the objectives contained within the Plan which includes identifying the Key Stakeholders, establishing regular

meetings and developing the terms of reference. A key finding from the consultation process has highlighted the need to avoid being perceived as too prescriptive and bureaucratic in its approach to the partnership forum and to develop the mechanisms as it evolves.

6.1 The potential to assist with the partnership forum.

## 7. FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS (DMe)

The cost of producing the Conservation Management Plan was met through a grant from English Heritage and County Council resources received by the Leicestershire County Council.

Any further implementation of the proposals in the plan will be funded from externally funded programme such as Heritage Fund landscape partnership bid and will be identified through re-prioritisation of their work programmes and existing resources.

There are no direct financial implications arising from this report to Hinckley and Bosworth Borough Council.
